Dear Brother Norris:

The following is my Department Report for New York for March 2017:

Having served now for the last ten months as Commander of the Department of New York, I am pleased to report that we have been actively engaged in a variety of activities across the state seeking to bring positive attention to those issues and events affecting the memories of our beloved ancestors who served the Union during the Civil War.

Since our last department encampment in May of 2016, I was pleased to attend several events over the past summer. They included a memorial ceremony in Shohola, PA, hosted by the Colonel

Augustus Van Horne Ellis Camp #124 and the Wayne County (PA) Historical Society, which was the site of a horrific train accident killing and injuring many unfortunate Confederate prisoners of war, union guards, and Erie Railroad employees. A descendant of one of the CSA dead who was buried nearby attended the ceremony and was deeply appreciative of the event. In August, the George L. Willard Camp #154 of Albany, NY held a ceremony honoring a Medal of Honor recipient, Peter Van Hoesen, buried in Coeyman"s Hollow, NY. Over 100 people came to the event.

In October, the Department lost of one its most active and respected brothers, Earl Allen. Earl was a Past Department Commander and served as the Secretary-Treasurer for two of our camps, Homer Searle Camp #114 and Stewart-Hope Camp #126. Myself and representatives from across the state attended the memorial service held in his honor. He was truly dedicated to those he served and also to those he honored. He will be missed terribly.

We continue to reach out for new members, believing that as our existing members age we need them to sustain and grow the organization. I would like to single out my Junior Vice Commander Leo McGuire was offering wonderful ways to accomplish this task. Our Rally Around the Flag Committee has been searching for ways to finance the restoration of the NY State Civil War battle flags. In Brooklyn, the Oliver Tilden Camp #26 has made progress in establishing a museum to remember the USS Monitor where it was built and launched in 1862. In November, the Abraham Lincoln Camp #6 assisted the American Legion in dedicating a new headstone for George Gerry Thayer in Lyndonville, NY. Thayer served in the 8th NY Heavy Artillery.

In terms of communications, we have a website maintained by an appointed webmaster (Robert Paul). Our Department Newsletter was published in December and another is due out in April just before our next encampment. We regret that our newsletter editor, Donald Zeilman, will be stepping down from his position after seven years of excellent service to the department.

I will be attending and representing the Dept. of New York at the annual Ulysses S. Grant Celebration which will be held on April 30th. Our 134 Department Encampment is scheduled to take place May 6th and 7th at the Ramada Inn in Ithaca, NY.

Finally, I wish to thank my Counselor Danny Wheeler, my Department Secretary Robert Pugsley and all the other elected and appointed officers for their advice, counsel, and support.

Dear Commander Ellis-Graham and Brothers of the Department of New York:

Please let this letter serve as the Annual Report of the Treasurer of the Department of New York, SUVCW to the 134th Encampment of Department of New York.

First let me apologize to the Department for my failure to be as diligent in my responsibilities as Treasurer as I normally am and to the Commander for my failure to provide him with the assistance I would have normally provided during my years as an officer of the Department of New York. Unfortunately, personal matters involving my late mother, whose health turned for the worse both physically and mentally within a week or two of the conclusion of the last Encampment, resulted in numerous trips to Maine where she resided to deal with her mounting issues of appropriate care, treatment, housing, and hospitalization exacerbated by her rapid mental decline into dementia along with a terminal illness which resulted in her passing in November of last year. In addition, during my routine annual physical exam it was discovered that I had developed an arrhythmia which subsequently resulted in my hospitalization in January, February and most recently last week for treatment.

The Department currently now has two bank accounts (one savings and one checking) located at the Wells Fargo Bank. The current balance in those two accounts as of May 1, 2017 are reflected in the handout entitled "Treasurers Report of Account Balances" Copies of bank statements for all accounts from April 2016 through May 1, 2017 have already been provided to the Department Council in accordance with the Bylaws along with all other financial records of all the Department accounts.

In addition, the Department continues to have the two CDs which are also reflected in that report. One CD representing the Department's Permanent Fund as called for in the Bylaws and a second representing a portion of the monies turned over in the form of bank checks by our prior Treasurer, Michael Bennett purporting to be from CDs he had reported as existing at the 130th Department Encampment. These current CDs were opened pursuant to the directive of the 131st Department Encampment, the larger CD just recently renewed and the second which represents the Department Permanent Fund will renew in October of this year.

Also per the directive of the 131st Department Encampment, I opened a Department Mutual Fund account through Northwestern Mutual for an investment in a relatively conservative mutual fund. Also reported in the "Account Balances report" which reflects it earned over a 6% increase over last year at this time.

Per the directive of the 131st Department Encampment, I continue to hold \$10,000.00 for purposes of creating a fund to award an annual grant of \$500.00 to be used within the Department to assist in the renovation or restoration of area monuments, memorials, or artifacts. The Committee formed pursuant to that 131st Encampment directive to develop the procedures for awarding those grants will be made a report last year but unfortunately due to an oversight it proposal was never brought before the Encampment for approval. We hope to have that accomplished this year.

I have provided two handouts to the Encampment. One provides the Encampment with the current balances in each account. Careful note should be made of the footnotes that accompany them. The second provides the proposed Budget for the upcoming fiscal year, which we will vote on later today; along with a report, as I did last year that shows the prior year's budget versus the actual income and expenses during that fiscal year. Please note that the fiscal year for the Department runs from July 1 through June 30. Please further note that we are currently still within the 2016/2017 fiscal year. Please further realize that almost all the financial activity of the Department occurs between April and June of each year. Therefore, it is difficult to get a clear picture of the Department's fiscal picture at an Encampment. This report concerning the Department's activities for the entire prior year's fiscal year gives us a better idea of the Department's financial activities and increases our ability to predict more accurately the Department income and expenses. The primary source of all the Department's Income comes from three places. These are our Department dues (\$6 per member), our raffle, and a small amount from our Encampment registration fee. The clear majority of our monies however come from the dues which accounted for 89.8% of our income, of which 75.1% of those dues was a pass through to the National Organization.

In regards the proposed budget I would simply like to highlight two area in which I seek to increase spending. One under Department Encampment line 68305 Supplies/Expenses which I increased from \$50 to \$200.00. This reflects the fact that paying for meeting rooms is becoming more prevalent for Encampments. In addition, there are frequently costs for audio visual equipment. Last year between the line item 68301 Encampment Committee and this line 68305 we spent \$498.35 for meeting room rentals and audio visual, we only had \$250.00 budgeted. Secondly, I have proposed an increase from \$0 to \$375 on line 65050 Equipment and capital assets, under Operations. This reflects 2 things. The current version of Quickbooks Pro software I use to manage this account is not compatible with Windows 10 which I have now on my computer, more importantly as of May 31, 2017 Quickbooks is no longer supporting it. I have priced a current version and believe I can get one for around \$180.00. In addition, last year this Encampment approved as a recommendation the purchase of cases for the gavel, bible, and banners. To my knowledge that has not been followed through as no one has made any inquiry about funding, no one has sent me any invoices or requested any reimbursement for buying them and equally important it was not budgeted for. The additional monies in that line item reflect money for them.

Now some advice, as I have frequently stated since I been giving reports at these Encampments as the GAR Highway Officer in 2005, all officers elected or appointed at any level need to become familiar with and abide by their job duties and responsibilities under both the National Rules and Regulations, the National Job Descriptions, National Policies, the Department Bylaws Department Policies and the Camp bylaws and see that they are followed. There is really, no excuse whatsoever for those who seek and obtain these offices for not knowing their responsibilities, that is particularly true for those of us who seek elective office.

In addition, and equally important is knowing what happened at the Encampment you were elected at. Encampments pass Bylaws, Resolutions and approve recommendations and expect the

Commander or his designee to see that they are carried out. So, it's important to note them at the encampment and to follow through with them. That does not always happen, and with due respect I do not think that happened this year. It is here at the Encampment that it is decided what the Department can and cannot do as long as it does not violate National Rules and Regulations. We as officers of the Department follow your dictates as you represent the very essence of this organization the members and the camps. They are the life blood for which we as a Department exist. You as those representatives have the right to expect that we follow those dictates.

Further to attract new members and to keep those who are already members we as a Department need to communicate with them and keep them involved. There are several ways to do that. We have as Department officers, both elected and appointed, representation from most of our camps. It is important for a Department Commander to communicate with them regularly on what is going on both in the Department and on the national level and to encourage them to also communicate that to their camps. It is also important for the Department Commander to regularly communicate via phone, email or letter regularly with the Camp Commanders. Finally, it is of high importance that the Department Newsletter be published at least the 3 times a year as called for in the Bylaws and posted on the website with notice to the membership. It is the one thing tangible we can provide our members. It also provides a forum for the Department to inform them of what is happening and for the camps and members to post articles letting other camps and Department know what we are doing.

In addition, and I believe our Department Secretary agrees, all Department officers who have any responsibilities regarding the Department budget, be they the Commander, Senior Vice Commander, the Department Secretary, Department Treasurer or any other officer need to be familiar with the adopted budget and follow it. The budget is not something to ignore. It represents the will of the members and the camps through their delegates at the Encampment on how they wish us to spend the Department funds, which after all come to us from our membership.

Finally, I have a resolution and a proposed Bylaw change which I have also handed out and would like to briefly discuss. The resolution involves the same resolution regarding a committee to explore a National Encampment in New York passed last year but apparently never appointed. The second involves a Bylaw arising out of General Order concerning the protection of members and associates under the age of 18.

In closing, I thank you for your support and I look forward to continuing to serve the Department and the Order.

Final Report of the Memorials Officer

Department Encampment, May 2017

[1] Recovery of NY Monument Data

During the period leading up to the 133rd Encampment in 2016, there was an GAR Sesquicentennial initiative to register New York State monuments and memorials with our National Organization. During that initiative 18 monuments were submitted to the National Memorials Officer. During the Encampment, however, Brother Todd Shillington, PDC recalled that a larger number of monuments was submitted to the National SUVCW but did not appear to be recognized on their website.

Brother Shillington had an Access database (*.mdb files) that contained the records but due to the age of the information and the version of Access originally used, the data could not be recovered. Multiple attempts at recovery by Brother Shillington and Brothers David Dziewulski and Frank Rogler of Willard Camp resulted little success. Eventually, with the assistance of a friend of Brother Dziewulski, both the New York and National data were recovered.

A brief summary spreadsheet of the 133 NY monuments is attached to this document. In addition, a CD is accompanying this report contains all the information that was recovered. It should be noted that although the data were recovered the original application that was used to input the data was not.

[2] General Thomas and the Kellogg Family Plot

Progress continues on efforts to maintain and upgrade the Kellogg Family plot in Oakwood Cemetery. Through the efforts of Willard Camp Graves Registration Officer Brothers King, a new attempt at the removal of the massive dead Birch tree has been initiated. Negotiations have begun with a vendor to arrange for the low-cost removal of the tree; the funds on-hand would probably be sufficient (approximately \$900). Another meeting with Chief Administrator Mr. Bernie Vogel of Oakwood Cemetery, members of the Board of Trustees, The Friends of Oakwood Cemetery, Willard Camp and the tree removal vendor is being arranged for later in the Spring (mid-May, 2017 at the earliest). No work will be done until the weather moderates and the ground surrounding the plot becomes less water logged from snow melt and recent rains.

This April 3, 2017 was the sesquicentennial of the founding of the Grand Army of the Republic in New York State in Albany. James B. McKean of Saratoga Springs was the first department commander and the first senior vice commander-in-chief.

The GAR existed in NYS until June 1948 when in Rochester the only member attending, James A. Hard relinquished the charter. He lived until March 12, 1953 and thus became the last of the "Boys in Blue" from NYS at age 111.

If it were not for the Allied Orders of the GAR, the memory of the GAR would be religated to books and cemeteries and all their hard fought benefits, traditions and beliefs would have been forgotten.

The history of the GAR and Allied Orders can be found on the websites of our camps, departments and national body. Individual members have their own websites. The voluminous amount of information is more than one person can compile.
