
I hope this finds you well!

GAR Death and Burial Records



Pictured here, on November 8, 2025, Anton Schwarzmüller, Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War Department of NY Senior Vice Commander, brought a ledger of Grand Army of the Republic deaths of Civil War veterans in Buffalo and Vicinity since 1917, to Librarian Adam Rubin at the Grosvenor Room of the downtown Buffalo and Erie County Public Library. The ledger owner is PDC and current Historian of the Department of NY Jerry Orton. Mr. Rubin professionally scanned the ledger for free, using equipment that the library acquired through a grant from The William G. Pomeroy Foundation.

Mr. Rubin states, "If you're interested in the Library hosting a digital copy w/ notes of the ledger for public use, we'd essentially need someone who's an authorized agent of the organization that owns the item, or the owner themselves, to sign a form providing the library with a license to retain, preserve, and do whatever we'd need to do with the digital copy of the item. We're currently working on writing that type of agreement, as it's not something the library has done regularly before and our existing agreements don't cover this type of license. We're in the process of designing a digital community archive at the library, so this type of material is definitely the type of thing I'd love to be able to host for the public in the near future. Unfortunately, we just don't have the paperwork trail set up yet."

There are 651 handwritten entries of names in the ledger. Columns on each ledger page are for name of veteran, G.A.R. Post, Branch of Service, Date of Death, Age, Cemetery, Section, Lot, Grave, and Remarks. There are some duplicate entries and some entries for veterans outside of the time and place parameters, meaning deaths before 1917 and graves not in western New York state.

Brother Anton Schwarzmüller checked every veteran grave entry, compiling a list of remarks identifying errors and deficiencies, some of which prevented locating a grave or service record. To the

furthest extent possible, all ledger entries were checked for inclusion in the graves database of the Sons of Union Veterans or added to the database.

The ledger was bound by Adams & White Company, Manufacturing Stationers, Printers, Blank Book Makers, 94-96 Pearl St., Buffalo, NY. There is no copyright and nothing written that identifies the contributors, scribes, authority, or original owner, but the binder is "G.A.R. Record of Deaths, B".

SUVCW Decentralizes Fulfillment of ROTC and Junior ROTC Medals for outstanding cadets.

A recent General Order from the Commander in Chief requires Departments which participate in the ROTC or JrROTC Programs to appoint a Department Coordinator who will maintain a stock of medals and respond to requests from Camps and Cadet Units for them, replacing the system whereby all requests went to National. Department Commander Jeff French appointed Brother Paul Farinella, LTC USA (Retired), Moses A. Baldwin Camp #544, as Coordinator for the Department of NY. Bro. Paul, a retired High School science teacher is also Commander, Region III, Military Order of the World Wars (MOWWW). Region III includes New York.

Headstone Work Completed

After 100 years, Silas Wright Holt's (May 6, 1846- Sept. 24, 1920) military headstone in Maple Grove Cemetery, Waterloo, Seneca County had almost completely sunk into the ground as in the first photo below. Wright had served as a private in Co. H, 76th NY infantry. Seeing this, Department Graves Registration Officer Dennis Duffy, engaged Bill Cook's Monuments to raise the stone and pour a base.

The result is seen in the second photo below, both photos can also be seen on Find a Grave memorial # 161229254. Hopefully, now with a proper base, we'll be good for the next 200 years! Thanks to Bill Cook for a nice job at a reasonable price.




Wreaths Across America

Civil War Sons of American Revolution Patriots

Schuyler Hamilton



Born in New York City on July 22, 1822, Schuyler Hamilton was the son of John Church Hamilton and the grandson of **Founding Fathers** Alexander Hamilton and General Philip

Schuyler. He graduated from the United States Military Academy at West Point in 1841. He served with distinction in the Mexican-American War, where he was twice wounded. He was breveted to the ranks of first lieutenant and captain for his gallantry in battle and served as an aide-de-camp to Lieutenant General Winfield Scott.

Civil War Service

At the outbreak of the Civil War, Hamilton returned to military service. He enlisted as a private in the 7th New York National Guard

but was quickly recognized for his prior experience and was rapidly promoted. He was appointed as a brigadier general in November 1861 and served on the staff of General Henry Halleck. His most significant contribution came during the New Madrid and Island No. 10 Campaign in early 1862. During the siege, Hamilton suggested cutting a canal to allow Union forces to bypass the Confederate batteries, a strategy that ultimately led to the capture of the island. For this successful operation, he was selected for promotion to major general in September 1862. He later commanded a division and then the right wing of the Army of the Mississippi during the Siege of Corinth. However, a prolonged illness compelled him to resign from the army in February 1863, ending his combat career.

Later Life and Legacy

After the war, Hamilton returned to New York City. From 1871 to 1875, he worked as a hydrographic engineer and superintendent for the city's Department of Docks before retiring due to poor health. He continued to be involved in civic life, writing an address on the history of the American flag that was later published. Schuyler Hamilton died on March 18, 1903, at the age of 80. He is buried at Woodlawn Cemetery in the Bronx, New York. His military career is a notable example of a West Point graduate who transitioned from

the regular army to a volunteer commission to serve his country during its greatest time of need.

John Goodnough



John T. Goodnough, 84, of Pamela Drive, Binghamton, NY passed away Saturday, November 15, 2025 at Wilson Hospital. Born in Johnson City, he is the son of Thomas and Marion Goodnough of Binghamton. He was a 1959 graduate of Chenango Valley Central School District. John received his Associates Degree in Civil Engineering from Broome Community College, and subsequently achieved his Professional Engineer's (PE) License.

John was a Civil Engineer with EMJ/McFarland-Johnson Engineers for over 20 years. He oversaw the construction of multiple highways, bridges and airports throughout Connecticut, Vermont, and New York State. Later in his career, through his love of trains, he opened up a model train shop on lower Front St., Binghamton.

John had multiple talents and interests, with a strong love of history and farming. He was a skilled carpenter who built everything from home furniture, the family home, to the barn that housed the farm animals he loved and cared for. Perhaps his greatest building project was a two ton working train in his own backyard, with 600 feet of track, a station and storage house. This train (he called the Chenango Falls Railway) would travel throughout the woods and hillside of his property, offering family and friends a brief trip back in time. He was known as the “Casey Jones” of Chenango Forks.

He was an active member and participant in several historical societies, holding various offices in each: National Railway Historical Society, The Binghamton Civil War Historical Society and Roundtable, Sons of Union Veterans of The Civil War, and The Goodenow Family Association.

John was predeceased by his parents and his brother, Richard Goodnough . He is survived by his beloved daughters Susan

Goodnough, Jacqueline (James) Carrese, and Jennifer (Jon) Chetwynd. He is also survived by his grandchildren Jessica (Dan) Peck, Matthew (Ashly) Poodiack, Jason (Kyle) Cummings, Luca Carrese, Jon Chetwynd, Thomas Chetwynd, and four great-grandchildren. Burial will be in Riverhurst Cemetery in Endwell.
